A Message of Hope this Easter

It's coming close to a year since Simon our Chairman, asked me to be the regional lead for Scotland or for us, a country lead as we are quite unique up here as we have a service that covers the whole country!

I thought I better get my finger out and write a message to you all and introduce your colleagues and myself from north of the border. We have Yvonne who is a Paramedic, George who is a Technician, Alec too who all work for the Scottish Ambulance Service and we have myself who unfortunately don't work for the Service yet. I'm hoping in the next couple years to go to university to train as a paramedic but just now, I work for private ambulance companies through the UK as an Event Medic and I really enjoy it.

I would like to give you a message of hope this Easter from Rev Michele Lees from Echuca Moama Uniting Church which really comforted me last year.

“Easter time is usually a time of getting together and celebrating, but with the current social distancing restrictions placed on us, this is not a possibility. Basically, we are to stay at home. So, does that mean we cannot celebrate Easter?”

No, we can celebrate Easter if we consider the nature of Easter. It is essentially about new life, symbolised in the Easter egg, the rabbit a prolific breeder, and the butterfly.

These symbols direct us to the Christian story of Easter, the new life which is given to us following the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

The Christian Easter story can be found in the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John in the Bible.

They share the similarities of Easter Day being on the first day of the week, the day after the Sabbath, a woman or women going to an empty tomb, the presence of an angel or angels, and the directive to tell the disciples that Jesus is alive.

Matthew's Gospel differs in the emphasis on the presence of God in the Easter event.

This should not surprise us as the Gospel of Matthew begins and ends with the assurance that God is with us, in the birth of Jesus called Emmanuel and translated 'God is with us', through to the ascension of Jesus where Jesus tells his disciples, “And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age.”

On Easter Day, Resurrection Sunday, Matthew describes God's presence in the occurrence of an earthquake, an Angel of the Lord appearing like lightning descending from heaven to earth and rolling back the stone of the tomb to show the secured tomb is now empty, and the guards of the tomb shaking and becoming like dead men.

Jesus, who was dead, has risen from death and is alive again in a new way. Jesus’ resurrection was not a mere resuscitation, but a transformation into a new sort of physicality, a body that somehow lives in earth and heaven simultaneously.

It is the beginning of a new creation which will only be complete when heaven and earth are fully married.

Matthew’s Easter story shows that Jesus is with us after his death by recording that Mary and the other Mary meet Jesus outside the tomb, speak with him, and are empowered to go and tell other disciples.

At the time of writing, Matthew’s community was involved in the mission of telling the good news about Jesus, doing so in the power of Jesus’ Spirit following his resurrection.

Matthew’s Easter story reminds us that God is with us. We, like the women at the tomb, are to go and tell others the good news that Jesus is alive, God is with us.

We can still celebrate Easter while we are under COVID-19 restrictions because Easter gives us the good news that Jesus is alive, and his living Spirit is with us giving us hope and love in our troubled world.”

Whitefriars Church in Rushden Northamptonshire supports the Christian Ambulance Association. Whitefriars is a local church with a heart for supporting the community and for supporting Christians as they work on the 'front line'.

Whitefriars is part of the Church of England. We have no church building of our own, meeting in a local school which we work closely with during the week. We began as a church plant from Rushden St. Mary in 1991 including a summer holiday club and a weekly Sunday club for children not involved in any other church. Holiday club in 1992 had so many parents helping that it felt they were almost already part of Whitefriars and the decision was made to open the Sunday morning up to all ages.

By 1997, the congregation having continued to grow, the Diocese of Peterborough decided that Whitefriars was sufficiently well-founded to become an independent church in its own right.

The heart of Whitefriars Church has always been to the local community and to the youth but with links to the wider national and international communities (for example, we have links with churches and schools in Kenya). At the start of each year, 10% of the giving from the previous year is allocated to the support of mission in other areas. Some of this is used for local work within the town, some to other charities within the UK and some to our links overseas. All our links are regularly remembered in our prayers and many provide us with updates on the work that they are doing.

The Christian Ambulance Association is one of those 'missions'. We decided that this was a good group to support since we have a number of members of the congregation involved in the ambulance service, the NHS and other areas of health care, and those not directly involved very much appreciate the work done by and the stress under which these workers function every day. We want to support believers as they live out their faith in this important work and to see God glorified as they positively impact their colleagues and the communities they serve.

Getting to know your Trustees Martyn Hallett

Why become a trustee of the CAA?

Hi, I'm Martyn Hallett, one of the Trustees of the CAA. Let me tell you a little about who I am, why I am pleased to be a trustee and how I got to be one!

I should say first that I don't work in the Ambulance or Paramedic Service, and never have. If that makes me an unlikely person to be a Trustee of the CAA, then God must work in unlikely ways!

I grew up in Ealing, West London, trained as an English Teacher and taught for 5 years in London – first in Fulham, then at Kennington Oval. In 1985 we moved to Bedford, where I combined teaching and church leadership until 1993, when I started full-time as a pastor, retiring in 2019.

I'm now 64, and have been married to Wendy (a physics teacher) for 39 years. We have 7 children and 7 grandchildren who keep us both busy, even in lockdown! I currently work one day a week (officially!) as a pastoral coordinator for a Christian Charity who run numerous Care Homes and Supported Living Housing Schemes. I'm based in Bedford but visit a Care Home in Peterborough once a month. I spend the rest of my time in preparation for church "word ministry" and in voluntary work for other charities. Family, friends and reading (and coffee) happily fill any spare moments!

A few things beyond work and family: I'm an 'armchair supporter' of a London football team I began following in 1967 while still at school. But since their current form is 'disappointing' I'll say no more about them! I enjoy running: mainly in Bedford Park early in the morning with few people around. I follow national politics with maybe too much interest, and deliver leaflets locally for a political party. I love words – especially poetry. I love time with people, especially if coffee and food are involved!

I've been a Christian since I was 12, with plenty of ups and downs, and am still learning how great and gracious God is. As a teenager I began to realise how much I had received in life without doing anything to deserve it – a loving family, stable home life, good health, educational opportunities, and much more – and being a Christian simply confirmed that principle of grace: God's undeserved favour.

I remember as a Sixth Former helping with a holiday organised for children whose families would simply not be able to afford it, and hearing some of their stories. Even as a young man, my heart went out to people who struggled all the time with many of the things I took for granted.

After teacher training my first job was at a challenging school in a tough part of London. As a pastor, too, my heart has always been for those who struggle, wanting to help if I can, however God may lead. Jesus is the great example of serving others – he makes it a key value in his own mission: “The Son of Man did not come to be served **but to serve**, and to give his life a ransom for many” (Mark 10:45). Sharing gospel truth and pointing people to Jesus as the way to God is what we Christians must be about. But we can also learn to go around “doing good”, which Jesus was known for (Acts 10:38), and looking to do so in every situation. I’ve often felt I wanted to try to ‘put something back’ into the society and communities which have given so much to me.

In Bedford I’ve been a school governor for over 20 years: not always the most rewarding role, but very necessary. I’m a trustee of a Family Centre, supporting families in need with children under 5. I’m a voluntary chaplain for a Christian Charity supporting ex-offenders, where I meet some remarkable people who have made disastrous decisions in life, but now want to turn things around.

So how did I get involved with the CAA? Well, I’ve known Simon King (Chair of CAA) for over 30 years, since he became a Christian, and kept up with him on and off all that time. Then I made the “mistake” of inviting him to my retirement celebration! He contacted me afterwards about becoming a trustee of CAA, and the more I heard about it the more I was drawn in to want to help. It may be a cliché, but I was really struck again by the mission statement on the CAA website about working with “...*the same kinds of people Jesus Christ spent time with: the least, the last and the lost.*”

You good people in the ambulance and paramedic services – whatever your particular role – are helping people at the very moment of their struggle, and doing it day in, day out.

It’s not just faithfully doing what you are trained and paid to do; it’s doing it without complaining (at least not to those you’re helping!) and with compassion and kindness, often in very stressful circumstances.

We all really need you, and what you are doing really does make a difference. When it was suggested that without direct paramedic experience I would function like an 'independent' trustee, I found it impossible to say 'no'. I don't know first-hand what your work is like, but I do know that there are people in immediate and desperate need for whom you can make a real difference.

I sometimes think of a parallel from my own line of work. Last week I took a funeral: the husband of a lady I've known for 25 years. For her, it's a time of shock (he was 78 but death was unexpected) and of loss and deep sadness. It will usher in a time of loneliness and huge adjustment in everyday life. In that situation I know that the way I speak to her, and to family members I've never met, and the sensitivity I try to show in both practical and personal matters, will make a difference to the whole family – to their grieving, to their emotional well-being, and to the memories they treasure. So I want to do it as well as I can. It may be just one more funeral for me, but for a bereaved widow it's a day she will remember for the rest of her life. Likewise for your work: it takes special qualities to avoid total emotional detachment on the one hand, or total emotional immersion on the other.

So I want to say to all of you in CAA, (and to your colleagues, whether Christians or not), "Thank you! Keep going! We all need you!" For CAA members, we trustees serve 'behind the scenes' to fulfil the legal obligations of oversight of the organisation: governance, financial transparency, safeguarding, and much more; all the things that ensure credibility and accountability. And, very simply, as Christians we are called to serve, because we follow the greatest Servant of all.
